# TRUTH IN TAXATION

New residents, Daniel Van Sloun and Jennifer Spreeman of 410 Sundown Drive, were present to express concern about the tax rate in the city. Austing-Traut explained that the city's tax rate has fallen consistently over the past ten years from 86.4 to around 63.4. City Council gave a brief historical synopsis of the city's projects, debt, and taxation.

## **ORDINANCE FRANCHISE AGREEMENT**

Jared Johnson of Albany Mutual Telephone Association (AMTA) was present to discuss the franchise agreement and their service expansion to City of Avon areas north of the interstate. Johnson further explained the communications that will occur with the property owners prior to service installation. There is no cost to the homeowner to put the fiber end up to the side of the house. There will be a free installation into the physical home on the front end as well. There are often on-going promotions for installation as well.

Council discussed the specifics of a draft Resolution Authorizing Opt-Out Agreement that was presented. All property owners in the city will need to contact AMTA if they do not want the service brought into their yard.

## **REDISTRIBUTION OF TIF**

Austing-Traut explained that three TIF eligible lots have sold in 2023 which allows the city to reallocate an additional \$39,000 in deferred assessments to eventually be paid into the debt service fund. To date \$554,000 has been reallocated.

# ECONOMIC DEVELOPMENT AUTHORITY

Consider Commercial Redevelopment (CRD) Loan to Pure Bliss Salon & Spa. Samantha Jonas was present to express concern about the water pressure at the salon. Jonas had found that there was a water treatment system in place for decades that is not functioning and had not been serviced as the property owner had no knowledge of it. The request is for assistance with the cost of a new energy efficient softener. The EDA discussed the standards for the RLF Portfolio which require a dollar for dollar match by the property owner. There has not been an overwhelming interest in businesses wishing to access these funds and there is a healthy balance in the fund. For these reasons, and the fact that Pure Bliss has demonstrated that it is a well-established business in the community, the EDA expressed their desire to make an exception to the policy.

Mike Apel from the Community Center presented a feasibility study that has been prepared for a potential future community center along with a letter that will go out to potential donors. Apel stated that their goal is to raise \$2 million for the community center and associated costs.

LRIP grant application will be submitted in the next few weeks. The deadline is December 8<sup>th</sup>. Southern View 3 utility construction is underway,

# **ISSUES BY STAFF**

# **Fire Department**

Chuck Swenson gave an update on the Fire Hall project including a breakdown of the original schematic budget along with bids and quotes received. The original estimated budget was \$2,454,439 with bids/quotes coming in at \$2,382,510. Council will meet on December 18<sup>th</sup> at 6:00 pm to review bids and quotes and consider awarding contracts for the construction of the fire hall expansion/remodel.

Austing-Traut requested council approval for the hiring of three new FD Members: Alexis Nelson, Matthew Boundy, Andrew Wensmann. They began training 11/13. Pay will be \$15/hour.

#### Motion Goebel to hire Alexis Nelson, Matthew Boundy, Andrew Wensmann Second Schaefer Passed Unanimously

Austing-Traut explained a bit about how the new legislation regarding Earned Safe and Sick Time will affect the city. There will be little to no impact for full-time employees who already receive paid sick time, however part-time and paid on call (firefighters) will be impacted. Austing-Traut will bring a draft policy to the council for their review beginning in 2024.

# **Public Works**

Kurtz and Pelkey presented their report. Resource Training and Solutions completed the asbestos sampling for the fire hall. Request for \$210 additional for Resource Training and Solutions for 10 additional samples.

#### Motion Manthe to approve the additional \$210 for the extra samples taken Second Reiling Passed Unanimously

All three motors in the radiant heaters in the maintenance shop have seized up and are not functional. It is expected to cost over \$1,500 for new motors. Grutsch Plumbing and Heating is pricing out new motors. Council consensus to authorize the installation of the new motors.

Kurtz requested approval for \$2,005 for Install of Septic Guard Dialers Motion Schaefer to authorize approval of \$2,005 to Preferred Controls for installation of septic guard dialers Second Schulzetenberge Passed Unanimously

## **Police Department**

Chief Nellis presented his report and requested \$2,350 for body armor. The SWAT team is purchasing their body armor from TYR. Chief Nellis received two quotes for the tactical ballistic plates and TYR was the low quote.

2019 K9 Unit is at Schwieter's Chevrolet again and facing another \$4,000 repair. There have already been \$10,000 in repairs done to this vehicle since the city purchased it in 2019. Chief Nellis has brought his grievance to the general manager of Schwieter's Chevrolet. Nellis also mentioned that the speed signs have been installed, with the exception of the one that will be placed near the beach.
